Procedures for Patients with Severely Elevated Blood Pressure

A. Overview

The Institutional Review Board (IRB) requires that subjects receive certain oral and written instructions if their average BP is greater than 210/115 mm Hg.

B. Recommended procedures

It is recommended that the pharmacist take the following actions if this situation occurs:

- (1) Ask patient if he/she has primary care physician.
- (2) Advise patient to contact his/her doctor immediately or to seek medical attention at the closest emergency room <u>today</u>.
- (3) Record the average SBP and DBP and give the attached handout to reinforce oral advice and importance of seeking attention today. Sign the handout and provide a telephone number where you can be reached. One blank copy of this handout will be provided in each patient chart.
